

Pastor's Corner...



As I began my sermon on Sunday, August 27, I opened with a reflection from the Rev. Jill Duffield, a pastor in Charlottesville, Virginia, who described the hatred and violence which erupted in that city over the August 11-

12 weekend and then wrote, "The next day was Sunday. And it mattered. People went to the pews searching to make sense of what they'd seen on the screen or witnessed in person. People will come to worship Sunday searching for a Word of the Lord about Charlottesville. . ." I described how I too think that such an event cannot be ignored by the Church, whether we live in Charlottesville or not.

Pastor's Corner (cont'd)

I said that being able to talk about race is crucial for understanding our American history as well as our American present. Talking about race is crucial for living faithfully as Christians when understand Jesus' greatest commandments to be to "Love God and Love Neighbor." I described the cross as a Christian symbol that represents God's self-giving love in Jesus—a love which ultimately results in freedom reconciliation and not division and separation and enslavement.

The Affirmation of Faith in worship from August 27 included excerpts from an ELCA social statement called "Freed In Christ: Race, Ethnicity And Culture." The full statement was adopted by a more than two-thirds vote of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America by its Churchwide Assembly on August 31, 1993.

- The document describes racism as "a mix of power, privilege, and prejudice—[which] is sin, a violation of God's intention for humanity."
- It describes racism as imbedded in our society: "When we speak of racism as though it were a matter of personal attitudes only, we underestimate it. We have only begun to realize the complexity of the sin, which spreads like an infection through the entire social system. Racism infects and affects everyone . . ."
- It calls on Christians to demonstrate the love of God for the world in Jesus and to seek justice: "The Church exists to proclaim Jesus the Christ, whose life, death, and resurrection mean freedom for the world. The Church also exists to teach the law of God, announcing that the God who justifies expects all people to do justice. So, the Church must cry out for justice. . ."

COUNCIL NEWS

Compassion = 2nd Chance

Have you ever come out of church and felt the sermon was either long-winded, diluted the true message of the gospel, boring, badly presented, or you just didn't feel connected?

On the other hand, have you ever left church and found the sermon was on-target, something you continue to think about a week after sermon, or the pastor's sermon was grounded in God's word?

Pastor's Carl's sermon on August 6th was the latter, that is, his sermon regarding compassion was motivating, authentic, and his words applied to our everyday lives. His words, highlighting the various Biblical verses discussing compassion set the tone for his message to all of us. Throughout his sermon, he discussed various Biblical scriptures that were "overflowing with compassion" and the impact the scripture has on our daily lives. Prime examples supporting his theory were Psalm 145: "The Lord is gracious and full of compassion, slow to anger and of great kindness. The Lord is loving to everyone and his compassion is over all his works..... and Matthew14: "When Jesus went ashore, he saw a great crowd and he had compassion for them and cured their sick"

As I left church that day, I asked myself how do we (or do we) show compassion for our fellow person? Do we actively support those in need in our local community? If we say we are compassionate for those in need, are we giving them a second chance? What are we doing as an individual or as a church to give those in need a second chance? When we hear about those in the local community that are chemically dependent, do we give much thought of giving those a second chance? When we think of our strategic objective: "Actively serve and support the needs of our community by identifying outreach opportunities," are we thinking of providing those in need a second chance?



As you ponder my questions, I would like to share with you information about an organization (which I am on the Board of Directors) that is compassionate in nature and its ultimate goal is providing a second chance to "chemically dependent" women. Since 1986, this nonprofit organization, STEP 2, has been serving Northern Nevada with a purpose of providing "comprehensive, coordinated services related to the treatment and recovery of chemically dependent women and their families, resulting in sustainable self-sufficiency." It is one of the few non-profit organizations in the country and the only one in Northern Nevada that provides treatment to chemically dependent women and allows them to maintain custody of their children while participating in treatment. Currently, 70% of the women in the program have children. The treatment program can take up to 18 months for full recovery depending on the individuals' needs. "Since many clients are suffering from poverty in addition to chemical addiction, no woman is ever turned away because of her inability to pay for treatment." Step 2 treats a range of women in need—from women who are pregnant and IV drug users, women with children, or to any other chemically dependent women. They provide care for these women in the following settings: 1) residential facility & transitional housing, 2) intensive outpatient, and 3) outpatient.

As you think about compassion for others by giving someone a second chance (making a positive change in their lives) I ask you to consider how you or our church

There are various options: 1) monetary or in-kind donation, 2) sponsoring one of their special events, 3) volunteering at one of the special events or at the facility, 4) using your expertise/talents or profession to teach a class for the clients, and 5) donate furniture for the housing facilities. If you are interested or desire additional information, please let me know.

How Can You Share Y our Talents With HCLC?

Every year during our stewardship drive, we are asked to consider how can we can help HCLC by our monetary gifts and by filling out a time and talent sheet. As you prayerfully consider how you can share your time and talents with HCLC, I asked that you consider the category, Leadership, which has the option of selecting to be a member of the church council.



The following information is provided so that you have better understanding/appreciation of church council's responsibilities and also will help you in making a decision on becoming a member of the church council. HCLC's church council consists of the pastor and not more than ten members of the congregation. The council members are elected to serve a two-year term.

The church council is the board of directors acting on behalf of the church membership. In this capacity, the church council has the responsibility for overseeing the church's mission and the legal accountability for its operation. Essentially, as a group, the council is responsible for establishing our organizational mission, creating the strategic objectives to accomplish our mission, updating our objectives (as required) to ensure success, overseeing the administrative functions of the church—providing oversight to the Pastor and his or her staff, and responsible for the financial and property matters of our church. Of particular note is that the council prepares the annual budget which must be approved by our congregation.

The council meets the second Monday of each month. Depending on the agenda, the meeting normally lasts between one and half hours to two hours. Typical agenda items are: 1) Devotion 2) Financial Reports, 3) Pastor's Report, 4) Committee/Ministry Reports, 5) Standing Agenda Items, 6) Old Business Items, and 7) New Business Items,

As indicated in our constitution, there are four officers in the church council. The following is a synopsis of their responsibilities:

• **President:** The President is the "chairman/chairwoman" of the Congregation and the Council. The President is responsible for calling and presiding over the Council meetings as well as the Congregational meetings as required by HCLC's constitution. The President assures the Council fulfills its responsibilities "for the governance of the Church."



Landscape Committee:

The front privacy fence around the air conditioner is up, the final plan for the front "Perennial Flowering shrub area" has been completed, and you will begin to see work in the update and repair of the sprinkler system. As we move into September

communication pieces will be sent out on work days and planting. Watch for e-mail and bulletin information.

We continue to ask for God's blessings on this work at Holy Cross

- In addition, the President ensures the Pastor fulfills his/ her responsibilities as specified in the contractual agreement. Some other critical responsibilities are: 1) Ensures the Council meetings and Congregational meetings are run effectively. 2) Serves as a spokesperson for the church, 3) Works with the Financial Committee in preparing an annual budget for approval by the Council and Congregation, 4) Reflects any concerns the Congregational members have with the Council, and 5) Communicates to the Pastor the concerns of the Church Council and/or Congregational members.
- Vice-President: The Vice-President serves as the President if the President is unable to perform his/her duties. (e.g. presides over the Council or Congregational meetings in the absence of the President.) Additionally, the Vice President performs any other duties as requested by the President.
- Secretary: The Secretary keeps/records minutes of all Council Meetings and Congregational Meetings. Currently, our church secretary (Dawn) fulfills these responsibilities. In her absence, a member of the council who holds the position of Secretary assumes the responsibilities of this office if our church secretary is unable to do so.
- Treasurer—Linda Puckett, who volunteered for this position, is our Treasurer. At a minimum, she prepares the monthly financial report for the council, is responsible for keeping accurate financial records of our church, assists in the preparation of the annual budget, and is a member of the Financial Committee.

Duties of Special Council Committees:

- Staff Support Committee— "Committee is dedicated to promoting/advancing the mission and vision of Holy Cross Lutheran Church by cultivating strong relationships with the church members (congregation) and serving governance capacity with regard to talent acquisition and development of the church's salaried workforce. The Staff Support Committee is accountable to the Church Council and reports directly to church council. Primary responsibilities are:
 - Represents the congregation and church council on personnel related matters providing positive and constructive feedback and confidential support to the pastor and staff.
 - Develops policies and procedures and makes recommendations to the church council regarding hiring, dismissal, compensation, and benefits for paid positions."
- Mutual Ministry Committee—
 "Committee is dedicated to providing support to the Pastor and to church council. This committee is accountable to the Pastor and the church council. Primary responsibilities are:
 - Aid the Pastor in the planning of continuing education and sabbaticals that benefit both the mission of the congregation and personal ministry and growth of the Pastor.

- As such, the committee is a "consultant" to the Pastor on matters concerning his personal growth. The Pastor can share new ideas and or confidential matters with the committee.
- The Pastor may use this committee as a "listening post" to aid in resolving misunderstandings between congregational members and/or other paid staff."
- Audit Committee: Church council appoints three voting members of the Congregation. Members include a member of the Congregational Council and two voting members not of the Council. Primary responsibilities are: auditing the records of the treasurer, of the financial secretary, and any other financial accounts of the congregation on an annual basis.

Are There Any Special Qualifications Required To Be a Council Member?

The answer is No. However, in my opinion the following are some qualities that I believe a council member should have:

- An active member of HCLC who is willing to give his/her time and talent for our church.
- Regularly attends worship and committed to grow in faith
- Willing to lead spiritually
- Believes strongly in HCLC's mission and our vision for reaching the local community.
- Is willing and able to support HCLC's strategic objectives
- Willing and able to make those difficult decision with the understanding that he/she could receive criticism (rather than praise) for his/her decisions.
- Has the ability to think independently without insisting on personal bias.
- Understands the importance of confidentiality on sensitive information.

2017 Stewardship Campaign

As we are aware, this year continues to be a year of financial and operational challenges. While we continue to work through these challenges, we will be facing similar challenges in 2018. Prime examples are "calling and hiring" a Pastor, and having sufficient financial support to meet the needs of our church. Our goal is to form this committee in September. If you would like to know more about Stewardship or help with our upcoming Stewardship drive, please let a member of the council or myself know.


Looking forward to a prosperous 2017 as we provide and increase opportunities to enrich the spiritual growth of our members of all ages.

Happy Anniversary Holy Cross!

Pastor Art Bowman was installed as the Developer/Pastor of Holy Cross Lutheran Church on September 14, 1980 after being commissioned to begin work in the area in August 1979. During worship services on September 17, we will recall our history and celebrate our future.

We will sing "Lift High the Cross" as we recognize the church's 37th anniversary.

There were 142 people who were charter members of Holy Cross. The Church Chartering document signed by charter members hangs in the narthex/welcome space of Holy Cross. Check it out to see those whom you know! A look at our formal church registry indicates nine of those are still active at Holy Cross.
