Pastor's Corner



Celebrating Milestones of Faith this Month

In a sermon entitled "Toto, I've a feeling we're not in Kansas anymore" on Reformation Sunday on October 29, I told a bit about my journey of faith through relationships and events

from baptism as an infant, to Sunday school as a kid, to youth group and summer camp experiences, to adult who invested in me, and to maturing faith and leadership experiences in high school and college. I invited worshipers to reflect on similar milestones and relationships in their journey of faith and contrasted these experiences with the majority of people in our culture in which the common question from a generation or two ago, "Where do you go to church?" has become a puzzled or incredulous, "You go to church?"

As a community of faith at Holy Cross, we get to share in the mutual responsibility of marking these kinds of faith milestones in each other's lives and offering support, comfort, and encouragement.

Offering Received from "From Conflict to Communion, a Lutheran – Catholic Commemoration of the Reformation"

Lutherans and Catholics gathered for a special worship service on Monday, October 9 to commemorate the Reformation. Pastor Scott was one of a number of Lutheran pastors to take part. Preachers for the occasion were the Most Reverend Bishop Randolph Calvo from the Catholic Diocese of Reno and the Rev. Kathryn Gulbranson, Assistant to the Lutheran Bishop of the Sierra Pacific Synod. The offering received that evening, nearly \$2300, was divided equally between two feeding ministries, the feeding program operated through Faith Lutheran Church

and that which is operated by Catholic Charities. A photo of priests and pastors from the service is posted at the Holy Cross Facebook page.

- Service of Witness to the Resurrection giving thanks to God for the life of Cleo Streit, Saturday, November 11 at 2p.m.: We gather to comfort one another in loss and to hear the good news of God's steadfast love as we commend Cleo to God's care.
- faith Confirmands Affirm their *November* **19**: Confirmation is the process through which a young adult makes their faith their own by affirming or confirming the promises made on their behalf when they were baptized. Emma Lintz, Ethan Jaeck, and Michael Tegio, who have been meeting with me and different members of the church, are invited to reflect on their journey of faith during worship on November 19. The primary question they'll be asked on that day is "Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in Holy Baptism to live among God's faithful people...
 - to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper,
 - to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed,
 - to serve all people, following the example of Jesus,
 - to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

Let us join together as a community of faith in marking these milestones.

Disaster Response

During a time of an unprecedented number of disasters around the globe, the ELCA across the country is answering God's call to love others as ourselves. Here is a sample of what Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) is actively working on:

• In Texas, where Hurricane Harvey caused destruction, LDR is hiring a disaster response coordinator to work with our partners and affiliates to connect volunteers and donations to where they're needed most.

-ACTS 20:35

- In Florida, where Hurricane Irma caused damage, LDR is helping Lutheran Services Florida, with relief for their most impacted staff.
- In Haiti, LDR is supporting 100 female-headed households and 100 farmers whose gardens and livestock were lost to the hurricane.
- In Cuba, LDR is supporting the distribution of items like cookware, dishes and blankets to help families get back to normal life.
 - In Mexico, where three major earthquakes struck within weeks, LDR is supporting our local partner as they distribute food, water and other basic necessities to those who have lost their homes.

In Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands, where Hurricane Maria left devastation, LDR is coordinating the delivery of critical items including dry food, generators and solar-powered phones.

In California, where massive wildfires fueled by intense winds have forced evacuations, destroyed homes, endangered entire communities, and claimed lives, LDR, through the Sierra Pacific Synod and Lutheran Social Services of Northern California, will continue to respond to address the overwhelming needs

> of those affected. Your gifts will help us deliver a robust response on the long road to recovery.

Council news

500th Anniversary From Conflict to Communion; Lutheran-Catholic Common Commemoration in 2017: The joint service held at St Therese-Little Flower Church on October 9th celebrated the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. My thanks to all the clergy who put together an inspiring and thought provoking service. The focus of the service was the Lutheran-Catholic doctrine "From Conflict to Communion which was jointly published in 2013. In this doctrine Lutherans and Catholics discussed the history of the Reformation. "They express regret over the pain that they inflicted on each other, but also give thanks to the theological insights that both parties contributed and the fruits of the reformation that they have both received. At the same time, the document emphasizes the common responsibility to bear witness to the Christian faith and to work for justice, peace and the environment and fight poverty."

What was real inspirational is how the service highlighted the Five Commitments (Imperatives) which are essential for the continuation of dialogue between the Catholics and Lutherans. They are:

- "Catholics and Lutherans should always begin from the perspective of unity and not from the point of view of division in order to strengthen what is held in common even though the differences are more easily seen and experienced.
- Lutherans and Catholics must let themselves continuously be transformed by the encounter with the other and by the mutual witness of faith.
 Catholics and Lutherans should again commit themselves to seek visible unity, to
 - elaborate together what this means in concrete steps, and to strive repeatedly toward this goal.
 - Lutherans and Catholics should jointly rediscover the power of the gospel of Jesus Christ for our time.
 - Catholics and Lutherans should witness together to the mercy of God in proclamation and service to the world."

Again, my sincere appreciation to the Roman Catholic Priests and Lutheran Ministers who worked hard to have a joint celebration of the 500th anniversary of the reformation.

As we moved forward to end of 2017 and onto 2018, I read an interesting article regarding the Reformation that I feel is important to share with you. In discuss the Reformation, the author stated this movement "brought the Church back to its central focus on God's Word as our sole authority, and to the saving message of Jesus Christ, crucified, and risen, as our primary witness to the world." As a result of our heritage, we have a message that needs to be shared. And this message is: "We are not, as the Reformers well knew, an "if, then" people. If we do certain things, then God will love us. That is not the "Good News" of the gospel. What we are, is a "because, therefore" people. Because God loves us, therefore we respond in a life of good works. Our good works do not save us, but we do good works because we have already been saved in Christ."

I believe we should think of this in our daily lives. That is, how we can share our good works in supporting one of our critical strategic objectives which is actively serve and support the needs of our community (local and global) by identifying outreach opportunities. Through the continued efforts of many of you, HCLC continues to serve the needs of our local community and the world. Whether it is the Quilting group serving the needs of the local community and the world or the Service Committee serving organizations such as Ronald McDonald House, Hosanna House, Shared Harvest, Silver Sage, etc., we continue to see the positive impact of our generosity.

In addition to the above, I believe there are other opportunities within the church that your expertise/ knowledge would be of a great value where you can share your good works. Prime examples, are volunteering for Live Naivety, singing in our choir, or running for the church council. Think above it.

- Willing and able to make those difficult decision with the understanding that he/she could receive criticism (rather then praise) for his/her decisions.
- Has the ability to think independently without insisting on personal bias.
- Understands the importance of confidentiality on sensitive information.

Looking forward to a prosperous 2017 as we provide and increase opportunities to enrich the spiritual growth of our members of all ages.

The income stream Holy Cross depends on to continue in its ministries is more predictable as more members tithe through Simply Giving. The administrative tasks for depositing the weekly offering are reduced and accuracy is increased. All it takes is a signed form (available in the narthex), a cancelled check, your desired amount, and the day of the month for the withdrawal. You can drop this through the offering plate or to the church office.


Christmas Choir
