

Pastor's Corner



What losses have you experienced in your life? I recently was talking with a friend whose house was destroyed in a fire. When she called the phone company to cancel the service to the "landline" to the home, the agent persistently tried to switch her to another phone company service. My friend said there was no need for

additional service. She didn't care to explain more than was necessary. When the agent continued to press her about beginning a new form of service, my friend, who had grown weary of the questioning, just blurted out, "My house burned down!" The agent didn't know what to say and the call concluded.

Though a house fire may not be the first kind of loss that comes to mind when we think about how we respond to grief, it does illustrate that we experience a number of different kinds of loss over time and also that well-meaning people can say things that we experience as insensitive or unfortunate. While this phone company agent was clearly caught off guard in an unusual circumstance, even those who know us are often unsure of what to say to those who have experienced the death of a family member or someone close to them or when they've experienced another significant loss.

Pastor's Corner (Cont'd)

Sometimes, rather than say anything, a person may avoid this person altogether, which unfortunately can exacerbate a sense of isolation a person may already feel. This workshop which I'll lead is intended to help people identify common responses to loss, reflect on their own experiences, and discover more helpful responses. I don't think people intend to say something hurtful, but sometimes our anxiety causes us to say things that others hear as insensitive.

I've served as a pastor in Presbyterian and Lutheran congregations, as a hospital chaplain, and as a director of regional non-profits serving seniors. In those settings, I've accompanied people in crisis or who are coping with loss and grief, assisted them in talking about difficult subjects and helped them prepare for end-of-life decisions.

In the workshop, through presentation, class discussion and personal reflection we will:

- Identify our own experiences of loss
- Identify common responses to loss
- Ease our anxiety about responding to others
- Seek to be a more comforting presence when others experience loss

I hope you'll consider joining us and invite a friend to come with you. It's well-suited for those who have recently experienced a loss or who have a friend who has and who wish to better understand what they may be feeling and how to respond compassionately to others.

National Day of Prayer on Thursday, May 3:

The National Day of Prayer was created in 1952 by a joint resolution of Congress, and signed into law by President Harry S. Truman. In 1988, the law was unanimously amended by both the House and the Senate and signed into law by President Ronald Reagan on Thursday, May 5, 1988, designating the first Thursday of May as a day of national prayer. Every president since 1952 has signed a National Day of Prayer proclamation.

Prayer brings people together. Prayer builds bridges between opposing persons and even political parties. Prayer reminds us that we are created in God's image and He desires for us to represent Him everywhere we go. Prayer brings UNITY. In 2018, the theme will be Pray for America - UNITY, based upon Ephesians 4:3 which challenges us to mobilize unified public prayer for America, "Making every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace." Jesus' death and resurrection, there were followers of Jesus, but no movement that could be meaningfully called "the church." Thus, from an historical point of view, Pentecost is the day on which the church was started. This is also true from a spiritual perspective, since the Spirit brings the church into existence and enlivens it. Thus Pentecost is the church's birthday. Worshipers are encouraged to wear red on Pentecost as it is the liturgical color of the day.


Godly Play

Memorial Day Presentation

The True Origins of "Taps"

In honor of Memorial day, we thought it would be a good to dispel the rumor of where "Taps" originated: Hint....It's not from a letter found in a pocket of a soldier who fought for the enemy side.

The origins of "Taps," the distinctive bugle melody played at U.S. military funerals and memorials and as a lightsout signal to soldiers at night, date back to the American Civil War. In July 1862, U.S. General Daniel Butterfield and his brigade were camped at Harrison's Landing, Virginia, recuperating after the Seven Days Battles near Richmond. Dissatisfied with the standard bugle call employed by the Army to indicate to troops it was time to go to sleep, and thinking the call should sound more melodious, Butterfield reworked an existing bugle call used to signal the end of the day. After he had his brigade bugler, Private Oliver Wilcox Norton, play it for the men, buglers from other units became interested in the 24-note tune and it quickly spread throughout the Army, and even caught on with the Confederates

Not long after Butterfield created "Taps," it was played for the first time at a military funeral, for a Union cannoneer killed in action. The man's commanding officer, Captain John Tidball, decided the bugle call would be safer than the traditional firing of three rifle volleys over the soldier's grave, a move which couldn't been confused by the nearby enemy as an attack.

As for the name "Taps," the most likely explanation is that it comes from the fact that prior to Butterfield's bugle call, the lights-out call was followed by three drum beats, dubbed the "Drum Taps," as well as "The Taps" and then simply "Taps." When Butterfield's call replaced the drum beats, soldiers referred to it as "Taps," although this was an unofficial moniker, according to "Taps" historian and bugle expert Jari Villanueva. He notes that Butterfield's bugle call was officially known as "Extinguish Lights" in American military manuals until 1891. Since that time, "Taps" also has been a formally recognized part of U.S. military funerals.

The operation is run mostly through the efforts of volunteers in our community. A donation funded organization, they are "funded" by donations of clothing and monies from local individuals, businesses and organizations.



They partner with over 170 different agencies in our community (from the Washoe County School District to Shared Harvest) to distribute free clothing to people in need with 25% of their clients are under the age of 18. Each year they help meet the clothing needs of 25,000 people in Washoe County. "We are in this together! When we all partner together to improve our community, you get to be a part of something great in Washoe County".

All clothing items are given away at no cost to their clients. Their clients are given a voucher from a community agency and they may "shop" once a month.

A special thank you to Holy Cross high schooler Karl Goebel for helping Holy Cross gather and transport donated clothing from church to Good Shepherd's Clothes Closet, which is located at the Record Street campus on the east side of downtown."

Every month Holy Cross joins other Lutheran Congregations and delivers food and basic supplies to 82 families in the Reno/Sparks Area "God's work our hands"

During May we are gathering cold cereal, canned fruit, chicken noodle soup, tuna and shampoo for the monthly Shared Harvest distribution. On May 20th at 1 p.m. we will meet at Holy Cross in the Fellowship Hall to assemble and distribute 82 bags of food and supplies. We meet again at Holy Cross for assembly and distribution June 24th at 1 p.m. Additional hands are always welcomed on assembly and distribution Sundays! A reminder—please check food expiration dates. Only food with current dates can be used. Thank you for bringing only the requested items. Contact Veralyn Combs, 354-1957 or the church office for more information and to let the event organizers know you are planning to attend and help.

Holy Cross has participated in Shared Harvest since it began in 1998. Shared Harvest is a joint ministry of Lutheran Churches in Reno/Sparks including Good Shepherd, Faith, Holy Cross, St. Luke's, Lord of Mercy and Our Saviors. Food and hygiene products are distributed on the 4th Sunday of each month.--at 5 locations –Easy Inn, Santa Fe, TJ's, El Tavern and Moran Seniors. In addition Good Shepherd Clothing Closet clothing vouchers are provided. Our mission is to serve families, seniors, disabled, veterans and singles. Those who receive Shared Harvest packages are so very thankful for the help. Our outreach has become a sustaining part of many lives.

On the 4th Sunday of each month at 1 p.m., we meet at one of the churches to assemble the food bags. Each church hosts two to three times a year on a rotating schedule. Grocery lists are rotated -- each church brings five different items every month. Each bag contains peanut butter, tuna, chicken noodle soup, chili, cereal, canned vegetables, canned fruit, powdered milk, crackers and mac-n cheese. 82 bags are assembled every month. Hygiene products available are toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo, deodorant, bar soap, laundry soap and razors. Hygiene kits are provided at some locations, made with hotel soaps and shampoos. Church members are asked to save these when they travel.

At 2 p.m., following the bag assembly, the volunteers split up and deliver the bags to the locations in Reno and Sparks.

Ways to Support Shared Harvest:

- Contribute the requested items each month (leave in the Fellowship Hall)
- Make a monetary contribution –funds are used to purchase the requested items
- Participate in the monthly bag assembly
- Participate in the monthly distribution to local sites
- Serve on the Shared Harvest Committee
- Keep those that serve and those being served in your prayers.
