## ***Maundy Thursday Dinner Holy Week 2019***

Hello Family of Holy Cross! Another season of spring with Lent, Holy Week, and Easter has come and gone. Our annual Seder Dinner on Maundy Thursday of Holy Week, April 18th 2019, was again well attended and very much enjoyed by all who participated. So many hands and hearts, young and old and in between, make this event possible. We are very grateful for all the people (along with hefty portions of love, creativity, and the Holy Spirit) who made it all happen. The evening began with delightful hors d'oeuvres and a social hour, a wonder-filled worship service with the history of God's deliverance of his people out of Egypt, a delicious festival meal and decadent desserts.

For 2019, we had 119 attendees out of 123 reservations, which was a 97% attendance rate! As an inclusive and welcoming congregation at Holy Cross, we again had almost 1/4 of attendees as guests Thank you to everyone for making this event a place where members are comfortable welcoming friends, and where visitors feel genuinely welcomed. As a family, we exemplified our shared vision to Believe in One, Affect Many, and Welcome All.

New this year, we are tithing a portion of ticket sales to support Eddy House, a non-profit organization working "with homeless and at-risk youth to develop life and job skills necessary for sustainable independence"

([www.eddyhouse.org](http://www.eddyhouse.org)). Through the generosity of this congregation, we will tithe 10% of our ticket sales, approximately \$135, to this organization. The remaining proceeds from ticket sales and all proceeds from "tip your server" support scholarships and transportation to Christian summer camps for youth.



## Council News...

Mark Calise lead us in Devotions ~ The Good Samaritan ~ where have we experienced the actions of a Good Samaritan in our lives, how have we been a Good Samaritan?

We received the following reports:

**Financial Report** ~ significant increased giving in the first quarter of 2019 resulted in net income to date of \$20, 555. Balance Sheet was reviewed with focus on cash balances; Special Funds and Mortgage balances. Finance Committee will host a congregation budget meeting between services on May 5.

**Pastor's Report** ~ highlighted robust Lent and Holy Week services and activities; Summer Worship; Education, lectionary Bible Study; Visitations and Meetings and Synodical Connections. Presentation on updating our church software for keeping church records—the Council approved the purchase of Church Trac for \$350 using funds from the Memorial Fund for two years. This will significantly enhance our ability to keep records and communicate with members, friends, and visitors, positively impacting current operations and church growth. A procedure for membership record keeping was presented and approved by the Council. Pastor will hold a first step Youth Group gathering May 5, 4:00 to 5:30 p.m.

**Council Liaison Reports** ~ Liaisons have been in contact with committees and teams who appreciate the contact and connection to the Council.

Sue G, Stephany; Richard, Laurel:  
**Service and Fellowship** — has set the following dates: Summer Picnic, May 19, Oktoberfest October 20, Advent Tea December 8 and the committee is in need of additional committee members.

Diane, Sue V: **Education and Learning** — Godly Play will conduct a Godly Play lesson for devotions at the May council meeting.

Sharon and Mark: **Worship and Music** — council confirmed that members who volunteer to conduct worship service or are sole worship or music leader are to be offered the same pay as a contracted worship leader or musician;

Warren and Fran; **Administration and Support** — there is a need to replace light bulbs in the Sanctuary and perhaps in other areas of the building, and there has been interest expressed in holding AED training.

### **Other Business:**

Council approved the membership of Sheldon and Holly Flom; Jackie White; Jeff, Kathy, Abigail and Samuel Morris.

Dawn S. shared the first draft of the new Picture Directory, publication is expected within the next few weeks.

We have not received our gift vacuum to date. Should the gift not arrive we will purchase a commercial vacuum as previously authorized by the Council.

Richard E —reported that the “Clean Day” on April 13 is in “good order” with over 25 signups on the signup sheet with specific task noted. Coffee and Danish will be served.

A Thrivent Action Team Grant of \$250 was received to support the “clean day”-preparing our house for Easter guests and evangelism/marketing for Easter

Sue V reported that there is good interest from members in hosting Cottage Meetings over the summer, she has met with Pastor to determine dates, and Sue V and one or two other Council Members will host a Coffee with the Council on May 12 Between services— with a focus being the Cottage Meetings.

The operation is run mostly through the efforts of volunteers in our community. A donation funded organization, they are “funded” by donations of clothing and monies from local individuals, businesses and organizations.

They partner with over 170 different agencies in our community (from the Washoe County School District to Shared Harvest) to distribute free clothing to people in need with 25% of their clients are under the age of 18. Each year they help meet the clothing needs of 25,000 people in Washoe County. “We are in this together! When we all partner together to improve our community, you get to be a part of something great in Washoe County”.

All clothing items are given away at no cost to their clients. Their clients are given a voucher from a community agency and they may “shop” once a month.

Thank you for your clothing donations -helping families in need in our community. A special thank you to Holy Cross high schooler Karl Goebel for helping Holy Cross gather and transport donated clothing from church to Good Shepherd's Clothes Closet, which is located at the Record Street campus on the east side of downtown."

Every month Holy Cross joins other Lutheran Congregations and delivers food and basic supplies to 82 families in the Reno/Sparks Area  
"God's work our hands"

During May we are gathering cold cereal, soup, and shampoo for the monthly Shared Harvest distribution. On May 26th at 1 p.m. we will meet at Holy Cross in the Fellowship Hall to assemble and distribute 82 bags of food and supplies. We meet again at Holy Cross for assembly and distribution June 23rd at 1 p.m.. "Extra hands" are always needed and welcome on assembly and distribution Sundays! A reminder—check food expiration dates—only food with current dates can be used. Thank you for bringing only the requested items. Contact Veralyn Combs, 354-1957 or the church office for more information and to let the event organizers know you are planning to attend and help.

Holy Cross has participated in Shared Harvest since it began in 1998. Shared Harvest is a joint ministry of Lutheran Churches in Reno/Sparks including Good Shepherd, Faith, Holy Cross, St. Luke's, Lord of Mercy and Our Saviors. Food and hygiene products are distributed on the 4th Sunday of each month--at 5 locations—Easy Inn, Santa Fe, TJ's, El Tavern and Moran Seniors. In addition Good Shepherd Clothing Closet clothing vouchers are provided. Our mission is to serve families, seniors, disabled, veterans and singles. Those that receive Shared Harvest packages are so very thankful for the help. Our outreach has become a sustaining part of many lives.

On the 4th Sunday of each month at 1 p.m., we meet at one of the churches to assemble the food bags. Each church hosts two to three times a year on a rotating schedule. Grocery lists are rotated -- each church brings five different items every month. Each bag contains peanut butter, tuna, chicken noodle soup, chili, cereal, canned vegetables, canned fruit, powdered milk, crackers and mac-n cheese. 82 bags are assembled every month. Hygiene products available are toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo, deodorant, bar soap, laundry soap and razors. Hygiene kits are provided at some locations, made with hotel soaps and shampoos. Church members are asked to save these when they travel.

At 2 p.m., following the bag assembly, the volunteers split up and deliver the bags to the locations in Reno and Sparks.

#### Ways to Support Shared Harvest:

- Contribute the requested items each month (leave in the Fellowship Hall)
- Make a monetary contribution—funds are used to purchase the requested items
- Participate in the monthly bag assembly
- Participate in the monthly distribution to local sites
- Serve on the Shared Harvest Committee
- Keep those that serve and those being served in your prayers.

During the year the quilts we complete are displayed on a rotating basis in the Fellowship Hall. Each quilt has a description of the helping agency that will be receiving the quilt during our fall distribution.

The quilt group also maintains some quilts for our permanent collection. During the month of May you will see our Friendship Quilt displayed. We received the original quilt blocks from Wilma Maikel. We believe the friendship blocks, dating from the 1930's, were from her Mother. —look for the names and the date. Our quilt group member, Adeline Bergeson completed the quilt top in 2010—adding borders and hand quilting the quilt. We display this quilt on occasion over the year. Also look for the Prayer Quilt in the Fellowship Hall. This was the first project completed by the quilt group in 2007. The pattern is Split Rail. The quilt is tied with extra long ties so that anyone can say a prayer as they tie the quilt, or add a written prayer and tie to the quilt. We hope this quilt provides hope and comfort for all.

All are welcome at our quilt group meetings—regular schedule: First and Third Thursday of each month—9:30 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. Come join the fun!

Income reflects increased congregation giving, a \$5,209 memorial gift to the general fund and reallocation of \$764 excess in Pastor moving fund. Expenses are tightly controlled. Personnel expenses were under-budget primarily due to no Pastor salary & benefits the first two weeks of January.


