Council News

The Council met via Zoom on July 13, and we welcomed Alese Linder, our new Administrative Assistant, and Laura Grady, our new Financial Secretary.

Sue Gonyou led us in our opening devotions, the first chapter of our study book—Power Surge, "six marks of discipleship for a changing church", by Reverend Michael Foss. We will be studying this book through the year.

Highlights from Pastor's report: Outdoor Communion in the Garden services are going well (about 30 in attendance) and Virtual Worship continues providing meaningful worship including member participation in music and reading the lessons. A Hot Topic on "racial issues and what a sermon is" will be held via Zoom July 30 at 6:30 p.m. Faith Formation classes for middle and high school youth will begin August 16th – see "Upcoming Events" for more details. Pastor attended, via Zoom, a 3-day session—Faithful Innovation Summit.

Finance Committee report was received—please see the Finance Committee report in the newsletter. The Council approved the Finance Committee's recommendation that we pay our \$1,000 quarterly benevolence to Synod.

We reviewed progress on the Council 2020 action steps. Warren Kline reported on the Building and Grounds Committee, presenting the committee description. Pat Schlosser is the point person on building issues and Eric Weldon is the point person on grounds issues. The Personnel Committee: Jody Morrison (Chair), Laurel Lindstrom, Richard Eggers, Pastor Kathy, Steve Tate, and Diane Torry completed their interviewing and hiring of our Administrative Assistant and Financial Secretary. Sue Gonyou reported that Good Shepherd's Clothes Closet is closed and will reopen in January in a new location. Sue Gonyou has asked us to keep those donations at home for now, and please see the "Service & Outreach" section for alternative donation options.

God's Work, Our Hands Day is September 13, and we will have a "Random Acts of Kindness" drive, asking members and friends to reach out to neighbors with a simple act of kindness, and send us a brief video summary so we can "share the good news" – see pastor's letter on the first page of this newsletter for more details.

Laurel Lindstrom presented the updated and slightly revised policies on Child Protection, Sexual Misconduct, Emergency Operations Plan, Sabbatical. All were approved.

The council discussed when to resume Worship in the Sanctuary. We continue to be in Phase 2 of reopening. Following deliberation, we decided to continue Communion Worship in the Garden, Virtual Worship, and small group meeting in the church building. We will deliberate and discuss again at the August 10 Council Meeting.

Plans for the 40th Anniversary celebration have been scaled back, with the Anniversary celebrated September 20 at our Worship Service. This will include a dedication of the Memorial Garden, a virtual message of congratulations from Bishop Mark, and the 40th Anniversary Cookbook ready for orders.

Pastor led us in closing prayer, Thanks be to God.

Through June 30 total giving is above budget and expenses below budget levels. Extraordinary irrigation system repair expense of \$2,390 was charged to the Building Reserve Fund established at the January 2020 annual meeting.

June income was \$12,151, and significantly below budget levels of \$22,069, resulting in a monthly loss of \$10,801 and reducing the quarterly net gain and cash balances.

Holy Cross received \$36,700 in PPP loan/grant funds, May 6, a safety net for operations. However, the direction of finance and council is that if the funds are not needed, we will repay the loan/grant. We will apply for loan forgiveness as soon as the process becomes available.

Year to date we are holding our own financially, however, the June significant reduction in giving indicates that the COVID-19 health crisis and the "summer slump" in giving is having a significant negative impact on our financial position.

By mid August we plan to have giving statements through June 30 available. We are working through transitions in the Financial Secretary work, thank you for your patience.

Building and Grounds Committee

A Building and Grounds Committee has been formed and has been working over the past months. The purpose of the Building and Grounds Committee is to provide for the proper maintenance of all church property and grounds with the intent to provide a clean and safe environment for the conduct of worship, learning and other activities while protecting the very considerable investment these properties represent.

The goals are: 1) a minimum of unexpected repairs for buildings, grounds and equipment, 2) to be aware and informed about possible future needs (upkeep and improvements) and 3) to inform the Congregation Council of those needs regularly and as far in advance as possible. A committee description was written and approved by the Church Council. Some key accomplishments:

The committee established a process to review the building and grounds on a quarterly basis to identify any needed repairs or improvements to the property.

On Monday of the church "clean week"—a scissor lift was rented, and the tops of all of the lights and projectors were cleaned, the sanctuary cross was cleaned and oiled, and lightbulbs replaced at the front of the sanctuary; the irrigation system was repaired and is now working well; roof inspection conducted and minor repairs are being scheduled, servicing of our heating and air conditioning systems completed or scheduled.

Quilt Group News

Quilter's are busy at work in the Fellowship Hall on the first and third Thursday of each month! Come join us (please wear your masks, we also stay 6 ft. apart)! We have quilt tops to tie, tops to design and sew, and wonderful conversation around the quilt table.

The "Blue Basket" is back –and available in the Narthex for anyone to pick up a quilt top kit!

The Blue Basket expands our quilt ministry work by providing quilt top kits to anyone who would like to complete a quilt top at home, on their own schedule. Each quilt kit comes with instructions—with the additional caveat that for the majority of the charitable organizations we give to, we do not include any religious symbols —as our quilts are given to all based on need regardless of religious creed. Religious references may be misinterpreted jeopardizing the delivery to the people who need the quilts most.

Holy Cross Quilters donate quilts to Lutheran World Relief every year. We work together with thousands of Lutheran Congregation Quilt Groups across the country, donating nearly 500,00 quilts each year. These quilts are given to our brothers and sisters in need around the world. A report from Lutheran World Relief provides moving information about the "good work" of this Lutheran Church worldwide ministry.

"Today and every day, Lutheran World Relief Quilts give families around the world some of life's essentials, as well as a reminder that they are not alone". "First and foremost, recipients use their LWR Quilt to shield against the cold and rain, and for warm bedding. But their versatility also makes quilts useful as simple tents, floor coverings, or a wrap to hold a baby on a mother's back."

From Niger— "The quilts provide comfort, particularly to women, while restoring the respect and dignity of the most vulnerable people in the world. Quilts are a welcomed comfort, as most could only afford to eat one meal a day. For many, the quilts serve as their bedding. Those who cannot afford to eat enough cannot afford to buy blankets. They gave us blankets to keep us warm when it is cold. Truly this is a blessing, for this year we will not be cold."

Lutheran World relief has been in the "quilt business" since the 1945 — when Lutheran World Relief responded to the needs of families in post-World War II Europe. Holy Cross Quilters have been making and giving quilts to people in need around the world and in our community for over ten years. Please join us for creative work, fun and fellowship— "Gods Work our Hands".
