From Pastor Kathy:

Dear Friends,

In recent weeks, there has been much conversation about the recent council decision to explore how to be a more inclusive church. We have chosen a resource through an ELCA partner called Reconciling Works which we believe will guide us through an exploration process, which many hope will lead us to become a Reconciling in Christ congregation. I want to share with you some frequently asked questions that I have been hearing in regards to the council's desire to build a more inclusive church, and I hope that this will help offer some clarification.

What did Church Council really decide?

In late February, after multiple conversations among the church council and the recognition that a variety of people were feeling unwelcome at Holy Cross, the church council decided to begin the exploration of becoming a Reconciling in Christ congregation. The **only thing decided** at this point is that we are going to take time to intentionally explore what this means and what this would look like for our church.

What is a Reconciling in Christ congregation?

A Reconciling in Christ congregation is one that will ensure "welcome, inclusion, celebration, and advocacy for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions and work for racial equity and commit to anti-racist work" (Reconciling Works Website). Reconciling Works is the overall ministry that hosts the Reconciling in Christ program. Knowing we have additional concerns about welcome, we will likely expand the conversations to include discussion about increasing our hospitality and welcome over all.

"From Pastor Kathy" (cont.)

We are already a welcoming church, why do we need to be specific in our "welcome all" statement?

Unfortunately, things have happened within our congregation and the church council has noticed there are some patterns where people have not felt welcome among us. We believe that the resources available to us through Reconciling Works will be helpful for us as we work to build a congregation more inclusive of the world around us. There are times when it is important to specific people or communities that it is clear that they are invited to be part of our community and that we are a "safe place" for them to be.

Who will be in charge of the exploration process?

We are currently putting together a team of people (3-8) who will serve as our Core Leadership Team and they will guide us in the exploration. They will provide updates and information to the church council and to the congregation as well as plan specific opportunities for conversations and learning for the congregation. I will also be serving on that team and offering spiritual guidance for us all through the process.

What will the exploration look like?

There will be a variety of opportunities which may include: workshops, Bible studies, small group discussions, one-on-one conversations, opportunities for sharing, perhaps some guest speakers, prayer groups, etc. We hope these conversations will help us to grow beyond our assumptions and deepen our understanding of what it means to be Christ's disciples in the world.

Do I have to participate in the conversations?

No, but it is always helpful to hear everyone's point of view. If many or most are participating, then hopefully, we grow together as a congregation. If people are not participating, then it may lead us to assume we know what people think, which is not helpful to the process or to the church. It is absolutely necessary and important to hear from all voices.

How long will the exploration take?

We aren't sure. Much of it will depend on the participation of the congregation and the feeling that everyone is being heard and understood. Many congregations have done this in one to two years.

Will we get to vote to be a Reconciling in Christ congregation?

Yes. At the end of the exploration, the core leadership team will work with the church council and draft a new statement of welcome, which will specifically mention our commitment to being truly welcoming and affirming to all people, especially those of the LGBTQIA+ community and our commitment to racial equality (we also may decide to add other language, depending on feedback we receive during our exploration process). We would then as a congregation vote to approve a new statement. That vote would either show our commitment to be an Reconciling in Christ congregation or not.

I am really unsure about all of this. What do I do now?

If you have questions, concerns, or thoughts to share, please talk with me directly. By entering into a process to be more welcoming and more inclusive, I know it feels like we aren't being welcoming to those who are struggling with this exploration. Taking the time to work through these issues of welcome is important, especially for the future of our church. I encourage us all to join in the conversations as I think they will be important for each of us in a very personal way as we grow in faith.

Summer Services Update

Live-streaming Services

After a year or so of pre-recorded worship services, starting on May 16, we are moving to a new model. We are going to be live-streaming the 10:30 worship service (the 8am service will also still be held until May 30th).

What that means is that if you are tuning in from home, you will be seeing the worship service as it happens, so if Pastor Kathy makes a joke in her sermon, you may hear the laughter from those who are here worshipping with us and you will be enjoying the music right along with the rest of us. We think this will be much easier on our staff, and we hope it will foster a sense of connection to the community for those watching at home. The service will also be recorded and available to watch later in the day, if needed.

For those who are watching from home, you may notice some slight changes to the service as the in-person services have been slightly shortened to reduce the risk for Covid-19 exposure. As restrictions are lifted for our county and state, we expect to make changes in the worship service as well.

If anyone is interested in helping us with our livestreaming process, Michael Tegio will be happy to teach you how it works. (It's not as hard as it sounds... we hope!)

Pentecost—May 23rd

The celebration of Pentecost will bring the color red to the altar to mark the work of the Holy Spirit in the world. We invite everyone to join in the celebration by wearing red on May 23!

Summer Worship Schedule

It has been our tradition to have one service at 9am in the summer season. Knowing how excited people are to be gathered back together, we are happy to announce that we will be moving to our summer schedule on May 30, Memorial Day Weekend. As restrictions are lifting, we will be adjusting our seating arrangement and feel comfortable that we will be able to accommodate everyone. Also, if needed, we may have overflow into the fellowship hall.



Save the Date:

We will be hosting a Memorial Service for Pastor Roland Grumm on Saturday, June 5. The time will be announced soon. Many of you know Pastor Grumm passed away in November, and we look forward to remembering him and celebrating the resurrection he has experienced through Jesus Christ. The service will be livestreamed as well. We hope everyone will join us.





Masks and singing, Coffee Hour, and visits...

We are all anxious to begin worshipping without masks and we are eager to sing together again, but we continue to move slowly and keep alert to guidelines from the CDC and from the local government. When we feel comfortable to lift restrictions, we will.

In the meantime, we are hoping to host coffee hour outside as we move into our summer schedule, and will test the waters with our hot dog picnic on May 23. The way we understand current guidelines is that when gathering outside, you only need masks if you aren't fully vaccinated. We highly suggest that everyone of the appropriate age get vaccinated, but we understand not everyone can do so. We leave your participation in gatherings and outdoor masks to your discretion, asking that when making those choices, err on the side of caution.

In addition, Pastor Kathy got her 2nd dose of vaccine on April 30, so she is excited to begin to return to visiting in homes with others who are vaccinated and/or feel comfortable with her coming by in the middle of May. If you would like to schedule a visit, please feel free to contact her or the church office.

We continue to ask you all to continue with our indoor protocols... masks, hand-washing, appropriate distance, and attending only if you feel well and feel comfortable for the time-being. If you have any questions about this, please feel free to talk with Pastor Kathy. Thank you!

Community Garden

It's Springtime in Nevada and our Community Garden is getting ready for planting!

The soil in the boxes has been tilled, water turned on, and planting day scheduled for May 8 at 9 a.m. Frost susceptible plants should be planted around June 1. Over the growing season, gardeners visit their boxes and help with the community boxes one to two times a week to weed, check plant progress, and then harvest "the fruits of your labor"! Squash seeds are not recommended as the "squash bugs have won"!

Put on your gardening duds and gloves, wear a hat, and come enjoy "digging in the dirt!"

On May 23, Pastor will lead a "Blessing of the Garden" following the 10:30 worship service and then will have a casual picnic of hot dogs, chips and a drink (individually served following covid-19 restrictions).

There are 24 boxes and a couple of boxes are still available for members of Holy Cross contact Pat Schlosser or the church office to reserve a box. A small fee of \$25 is asked to help cover water expense. 11 boxes are planted with produce for our neighbor's at Silver Sage Senior apartments. The residents look forward to having fresh "home-grown" vegetables over the summer.

Our children in Godly Play plant a box of flowers that bloom over the summer — a delight to behold!

The Community Garden has been a blessing to our Holy Cross Ministry for over ten years. It provides an opportunity for members and friends to enjoy healthy, homegrown vegetables over the summer and fellowship with fellow gardeners, neighbors and members of Holy Cross.

A Message From Our Church Council

Council held our regular meeting via Zoom on April 12th. Pastor led us in opening devotions and prayer.

The minutes of the March 8th and March 16th council meetings were approved.

Pastor Kathy reported that Holy Week and Easter went well, we had over 94 people at the 4 in person services and 75 at the online services on Facebook and You Tube. Godly Play children created Easter kits for the congregation. Pastor and Godly Play are looking at having Vacation Bible School this summer.

We will begin to transition from our pre-recorded services to a live broadcast for online service in May. Equipment needs, such as cameras are being evaluated. Tuesday night Bible study with Pastor resumes on April 27.

Synod Assembly will be on line, May 6,7,8. Jeff Morris and Becky Bradley were affirmed as the voting members from Holy Cross. The Assembly will be online through YouTube, so all can log in and view the Assembly proceedings.

Finance committee reported, that until the congregation approves a 2021 budget, we are functioning under the 2020 budget. First quarter 2021 reports a gain of \$45,267, which includes \$47,000 in annual gifts. The PPP Grant remains untouched, set aside as an emergency fund in a separate account.

We received reports from Education & Learning, Outreach & Service; Fellowship, Administration and Support.

We reviewed current COVID -19 numbers and restrictions. We continue our cautious process of reopening the church building, being mindful of the current Washoe County restrictions. We expect new guidelines by May 1st. Discussions are ongoing in teams including Worship and Fellowship on how to continue to reopen the building and activities following expected new guidelines.

High Desert Harmony has asked to possibly use the building for rehearsals. As this is a small group (8-20), that wears singer's masks, maintains social distance, and bring a separate HIPA filter machine, council approved the use of the space.

The Audit Committee: Russell Tegio, Sharon Voss, Joe Krehlik were appointed.

The Council was recognized for their outstanding service to Holy Cross over the past year—and a special thankyou to those Council Members who have completed their term: Sue Volinkaty, Sharon Voss, Stephanie Robison, Sue Gonyou, Mark Calise.

I have been privileged and honored to serve as President of the Council for the past two plus years. My term will end following the annual meeting scheduled for April 18, and a new President will be elected at the May Council Meeting. During these past two years, I have been so grateful for the caring kindness and support of Holy Cross members and friends, Thank you. I look forward to serving my final council year as an active council member.

Revenue includes annual gifts of \$47,000. Annualizing the annual gifts—assuming the annual gifts were given on a monthly basis--would produce a net loss of \$1,188 at ytd 3/31//2021. Total expenses at 3/31 are \$836 above expenses in the same period in 2020, primarily a result of church maintenance expense, and paying all interest from general fund compared to balance sheet building fund in 2020. The HVAC unit has been replaced for \$11,205. The bill was paid in early April, and not reflected in the March financial statement. The PPP Grant of \$36,700 will be converted to an asset from a liability in April. A budget to actual for the first quarter was not conducted, as the 2021 budget was not approved until the Annual Meeting held on April 18.
